snicket ('snɪkət)n.
Narrow pathway or alley leading from one place to another, which may have walls or hedges on either side;
Old English **SNICAN**, 'to creep'

Historically Cam's mills were major employers. For 500 years a network of paths has been used to walk from the edge of the parish to the mills and the churches.

As the community has grown, and the number of houses has increased, the paths are still used by local people. But now, they have become tarmac paths, alleys or **SNICKETS** between buildings.
